

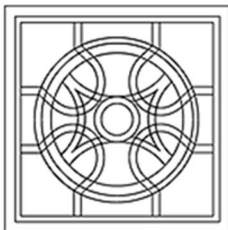

John 10:1-10

**COVER ART** Eugène Burnand, *The Disciples Peter and John Running to the Sepulchre*, 1889. Burnand (1850–1921) was a prolific Swiss painter and illustrator from Moudon, Switzerland. Born of prosperous parents who taught him to appreciate art and the countryside, he first trained as an architect but quickly realized his vocation was painting. A deeply religious man, his Protestant beliefs led him to include more religious works that he put his stamp of realism on, and he became best known in Europe for his illustrations of “The Parables,” which was published in French, German and English versions over four decades. His works are now widely distributed in museums and private collections throughout the world and in his own dedicated museum in Moudon.

## CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

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### SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

On Sunday mornings we offer classes for two different age groups—one for children ages 3 through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade (room 212) and another for children in grades 3 through 7 (room 201). Both rooms are directly adjacent to the chapel.

Our curriculum for both age groups, based on the Montessori method of learning, comes from Godly Play, using visual elements to hear Bible stories and then inviting children to express themselves by creating art or building and shaping things.

Godly Play is designed for children to both experience God and to find ways to express their faith experiences. The rhythm of Godly Play is more like worship than school and children are able to explore what they have experienced.

Our younger children from ages 3 to 2<sup>nd</sup> grade will be immersed in the stories of God's care for us, learning the ebb and flow of silence and interacting, of hearing and doing.

The older group, grades 3 to 7, will focus on the gift of creation and how we might think about the needs of the earth while hearing many ways in which people of the Bible carry out acts of love and care in challenging times.

Nursery care is available for children ages two and under and is staffed by two fully vaccinated, fully background-checked adults. Nursery workers will continue wearing masks.

Croquet is a sport that involves hitting wooden balls with a mallet through hoops (called “wickets”) embedded in a grass playing court. Join us outside on the lawn to learn how to play American Nine-Wicket, aka “backyard” croquet. This is a fun and engaging way to get some fresh air and exercise while learning a new sport.

### **TAKING CHARGE OF YOUR BONE HEALTH** (*registration required*)

There is a lot of confusing information about what to do if you’ve been diagnosed with osteopenia or osteoporosis. Medical evidence shows that some common exercises, such as sit-ups and toe touches, can actually put you at risk for spinal fracture. Doing the right exercises, improving your body awareness, and making some lifestyle changes (such as proper diet and not smoking), can significantly help build bone and prevent injury. Come to this important workshop taught by Joanne Fagerstrom, a bone health specialist and physical therapist of over 40 years, and see how you can take charge of your bone health.

Falls are the leading cause of injury or death among older adults. Emergency Room statistics demonstrate that older adults seek ER visits as a result of a fall, often time transported by an ambulance or emergency vehicle. Fear of falling often times decreases the older adult from leaving home for a pleasant outing or for a medical appointment. The program will include how to reduce the risk of falling and tips for a safe home setting.

One of the most important decisions of your life is how you wish to leave it. What if you can no longer speak for yourself? We will review a standard Durable Healthcare Power of Attorney and Living Will and learn how to create a legal document that provides instruction to your loved ones and your physician about the medical treatment you want or do not want to receive if you are unable to communicate your wishes about your care and treatment. By the end of class you should be able not only to have a more informed conversation with your loved ones about end-of-life and quality-of-life concerns but also to create your own Living Will.

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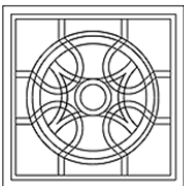
