

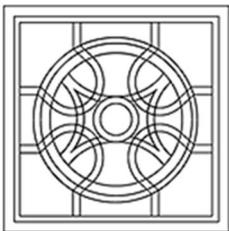

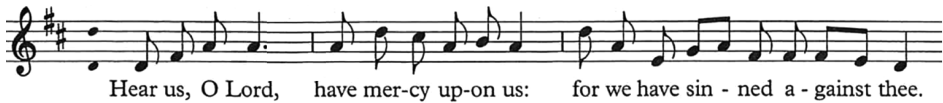

William Blake, *Mary Magdalene Washing Christ's Feet*, 1805, pencil and ink over graphite on paper, Philadelphia Museum of Art. Blake (1757–1827) was an English poet, painter, and printmaker. Largely unrecognized during his life, Blake is now considered a seminal figure in the history of the poetry and visual art of the Romantic Age. He lived in London almost all of his life, producing a diverse and symbolically rich collection of works, which embraced the imagination as “the body of God,” or “human existence itself.” Although contemporaries considered him to be mad because of his idiosyncratic views, he came to be highly regarded by later critics and readers for his expressiveness and creativity, and for the philosophical and mystical undercurrents within his work.

WOMEN OF THE LEWIS & CLARK EXPEDITION *(registration required)*

Thursday, March 21, 11 am-12:30 p.m., \$15

Women played a major role in the success of the Lewis & Clark Expedition. Even prior to the Corps of Discovery’s departure, one woman’s influence proved invaluable. Sacagawea is, of course, the most well-known female figure connected to the cross-country journey but, as Dr. Paul Sivitz will illustrate, she might not necessarily be the most important. Dr. Sivitz will

follow women's contributions to the Lewis & Clark Expedition from Virginia to the Pacific Ocean, then back to St. Louis.

Paul Sivitz received his PhD in history from Montana State University. He specializes in the fields of 'Early America,' 'Race and Slavery,' 'History of Knowledge,' and 'History of Performing Arts.' Dr. Sivitz has presented his research at conferences in the United States and the United Kingdom, as well as in Paris, Oslo, and Dublin. He is co-director of the digital humanities project 'Mapping Historic Philadelphia.' One of the project's maps, 'Free African American Householders in Philadelphia, 1789-1791' is part of the permanent exhibit at the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC.

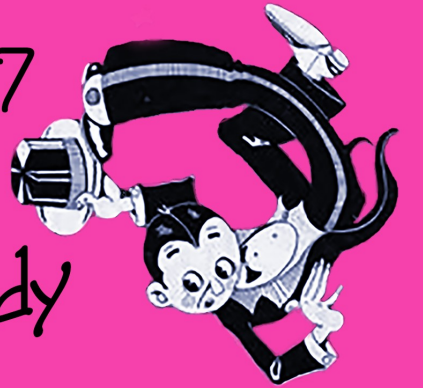

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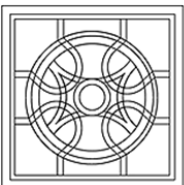
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
