

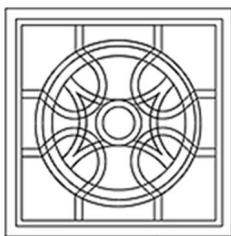

## ORDER OF WORSHIP

The psalm does not pretend that evil and death do not exist. Terrible things happen, and they happen to good people as well as to bad people. Even the paths of righteousness lead through the valley of the shadow. Death lies ahead for all of us, saints and sinners alike, and for all the ones we love. The psalmist doesn't try to explain evil. He doesn't try to minimize evil. He simply says he will not fear evil. For all the power that evil has, it doesn't have the power to make him afraid.

And why? Here at the very center of the psalm comes the very center of the psalmist's faith. Suddenly he stops speaking about God as "he," because you don't speak that way when the person is right there with you. Suddenly he speaks to God instead of about him, and he speaks to him as "thou." "I will fear no evil," he says, "for thou art with me." That is the center of faith. Thou. That is where faith comes from.

Speaker: Beth Shalom Hessel

Topic: The Right to Be American: Japanese Americans and World War II

During WWII, more than 100,000 American citizens and long-term residents of Japanese descent were placed by the federal government in remote prison camps because they "looked like the enemy." Japanese Americans and their allies found different ways to challenge the invalidation of their place in this country. We will explore the experiences of Japanese Americans during WWII.

*Beth Shalom Hessel began her tenure as the executive director of the Athenaeum of Philadelphia in July 2019 after serving as the executive director of the Presbyterian Historical Society, the national archives of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), since 2015. Beth holds a Ph.D. in U.S. history from Texas Christian University, an M.A. from Binghamton University, an M.Div. from San Francisco Theological Seminary, and a B.A. from the University of California, Davis. In addition to her leadership at the Athenaeum, Beth serves as Parish Associate at PCCH.*
