

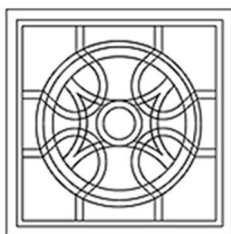

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON

Exodus 15:22-25, 16:1-5

Then Moses ordered Israel to set out from the Red Sea, and they went into the wilderness of Shur. They went for three days in the wilderness and found no water. When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water of Marah because it was bitter. That is why it was called Marah. And the people complained against Moses, saying, 'What shall we drink?' He cried out to the Lord; and the Lord showed him a piece of wood; he threw it into the water, and the water became sweet.

There the Lord made for them a statute and an ordinance and there he put them to the test.

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. FLOWERS IN THE SANCTUARY are given to the glory of God and in loving memory of my beloved son, **Charles L. Edwards, Jr.** by Dolores Edwards.

COVER ART Ercole de' Roberti, *The Israelites Gathering Manna*, late 15th century, the National Gallery, London. Also known as Ercole Ferrarese or Ercole da Ferrara, de' Roberti (c. 1451-1496) was an Italian artist of the Early Renaissance and the School of Ferrara. The son of the doorkeeper at the Este castle, Ercole later held the position of court artist for the Este family in Ferrara. Paintings by Ercole are rare. His life was short and many of his works have been destroyed. This work, along with *The Institution of the Eucharist*, was once part of a predella (a raised shelf above an altar) of an altarpiece for the church of San Domenico in Ferrara. The altarpiece may have been made to commemorate the death of Eleanora of Aragon, Duchess of Ferrara, who had a particular interest in the Corpus Christi ('body of Christ'). The story of the Israelites gathering manna—a heavenly 'bread' that fed them during their travels in the wilderness before reaching Israel—was often interpreted as a forerunner of the 'heavenly bread' of Christ's body.

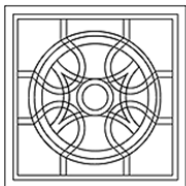
