

Cindy's Year-at-a-Glance

This year I am just skipping through highlights on my calendar. The highlights do not include the relationships that are at the heart of what I do and why. The names of those whose hands held for the last time in death appear in another part of this report, but each month reminded me of so many that we miss so dearly. Likewise the names of hospitals remind me of so many who have struggled with illness this year, some for the whole year. Neither does this detail worship and preaching or weekly Bible study, the anchors of my own life. I am grateful for every, every minute I have been given with you.

January

In addition to the usual meetings of Session, Church life Committee, Adult Education, Social Witness Committee, Finance, Investment Committee, Interfaith Center of Greater Philadelphia and Presbytery, what jumps out at me from my calendar are a multitude of meetings for the Capital Campaign. I thought that was over two years ago! What an amazing group of folks who mounted a second effort and led us to reach our goal.

February

While the meetings continued as well as visits to the hospital, memorial services planned and led, visits about baptisms or to welcome new members, I added an interesting responsibility to my life for the next three years. I flew to Nashville to be trained as a mentor for the Company of New Pastors in the PCUSA. With Casey Thompson, minister of Wayne Church, I will work with five newly ordained ministers in the PCUSA, following them through their first calls. It was also fun to return to the halls of Vanderbilt Divinity School where all my professors are retired or dead.

I also noticed a meeting for faith leaders at Lutheran Theological Seminary with Rick Jacobs, head of the Reform Movement in Judaism. The topic was how to lead and tend our flocks during a time of division and distrust in our national life. It brought back to my mind how challenging those months were in a community that is as diverse as ours is politically.

March

March began with a most amazing Capital Campaign Kick-Off Brunch with eating stations all over the church where renovations were proposed. So many more meetings about the campaign filled my days. The youth Spaghetti Dinner is always a highlight of this month for me. But then I realized that it was a month like no other for me personally. My dear friend Lindsey Christiansen, who had been diagnosed with a glioblastoma at the beginning of October, died on Ash Wednesday as all of us ringed her bed singing hymns. Soon after that, I was simply sick for a few weeks, through the time of her burial and service. I was so sick, I had to cancel a much anticipated trip to Beirut for the Lebanese American University Board meeting.

April

The first highlight of April was the Lenten service and Luncheon at Normandy Farm. Then it was Holy Week, leading to a magnificent Easter Morning. Elders were trained and examined, the Session retreated for dinner at my house and Harris for a Saturday spent thinking about hospitality and our church home. More Capital Campaign meetings, culminating in Commitment Sunday the last Sunday of the month. But the highlight of the whole month was Angry Church Yoga at Melody and Comedy!

May

The first week in May was spent with my parents in Florida. Little did I know what the next two months would hold for our family. I returned to the pew on the first Sunday to be led in an incredible service of worship by Brian and the youth. The highlight of the month was Staff Planning Retreat in Cape May at the DiDonato's home. All of us were exhausted, but we managed to put together another challenging year with NO capital campaign! As always, lots was dreamed about that has yet to see the light of day. As important as anything is the time we have together to bond (mostly) and overshare. Then it was off to Maine!

June/July/August

As you all know, the month I had planned in Maine was spent mostly in Florida as my mother died. I am so grateful for the time and the freedom you gave me to be, as my mother said, "her minister" for once. Let's just say, I am better at being your minister—or at least I hope so! It was a gift to spend some extra time with my father after my mother's death, so that is about all I remember of June and the beginning of July. I was supposed to preach at the Proctor Institute in Tennessee for The Children's Defense Fund but will do that this coming July. August, I flew back to Florida to bring my Father up for my mother's burial in our Memorial Garden where I also will be someday. The best thing about the summer months you will find in Brian and Austin's reports: the Youth Mission Trip was, of course, the best ever. Same is true for the Summer Music, Arts and Garden Camp for children. When I look at July and August, I smile at all the wonderful evening meals I shared in so many of your homes. What a great way to spend a life!

September

September began with a meeting of the Lebanese American University Board in NYC and, thanks to Austin's tip, a night seeing Hamilton!!! Meetings began again in earnest with Homecoming a week later than usual. Brian, Austin and I have now made a tradition of sharing the sermon that day and hope you look forward to it as much as we do. Stewardship Committee exploded with new members and new energy, leading to quite a campaign this fall. This is the month I first talked with Personnel about the options now before churches when a minister is retiring. It felt a little like jumping off a cliff.

October

Our joint Elder/Deacon meeting was a raucous rehearsal the next Sunday's kick-off adaptation of "Hello" from The Book of Mormon. Then the session had its first discussion about options for the church's approach to pastoral transition, assuming I would retire August 2019 or later. The discussion was led by Personnel with staff in my office. The middle of the month was the first Company of New Pastor's retreat at a lovely home in Cape May owned by a member of Wayne. A good but emotionally exhausting few days! The Youth Mission Trip Video has stars around it. Wonderful. But the highlight was Harry Potter Weekend organized by St.



Austin inside with the Youth doing amazing things on our church lawn. Wow. Just wow.

November

The highlight of the month if not of my 43 years in ministry was the Music and Arts Festival. From the teeshirt memorial erected by the youth to the Souls Shot opening with a packed and diverse crowd astonished at the portraits to 26 Pebbles read exquisitely on Saturday night to the moving and magnificently sung concert on Sunday. The witness of this church on that weekend, a witness that continues as Souls Shot is exhibited throughout the greater Philadelphia region as well as in the State Capital this summer, is unequal to anything I have known. Stewardship Sunday culminated one of our most exciting campaigns ever. As I drove to Maine for a much needed week to catch my breath, I was breathless at the gift of this church to my soul and to this community.

December

Music continued to fill my calendar in December: Pennsylvania Girlchoir twice filled the sanctuary, The Crossing @ Christmas concert returned to PCCH, the carolers were few but mighty as they sang for older members and then arrived at my doorstep for dinner, an overflow congregation for the Family Service of Lessons and Carols on Christmas Eve and then, as many said, our most moving ever service of Lessons and Carols at 10 a.m. I ended the year awash with gratitude for the privilege of being one of your ministers.

Youth Ministries, Senior Ministries and Adult Fellowship

Theology on Tap:

Since 2009 our numbers at Theology on Tap have grown from 4 on average to 12. We once had a high of 26, which admittedly, was too much of a good thing. We meet once a month from September through May in the Upper Room at Campbell's Place on Germantown Avenue. We talk, debate and weave our way through conversations on War and Religion; The Modern Christian Family; Bio-Medical Ethics; and other important debates. This group has functioned as a gateway for new members to meet others in the congregation in an informal location yet over serious discourse.

High School Youth Group:

The 2009 Youth Mission Trip was cancelled on account of having only 2 interested teenagers; additionally the 2009 Youth Group averaged 6 in attendance. Comparatively, the 2017 Mission Trip featured 21 youth and 4 adults; and in 2018 there will be TWO mission trips, each totaling about 20 participants. Over the last several years the Youth Program has not only grown in number but also in outreach. We have recently partnered with West Kensington Ministry - our youth have joined theirs in worship, as well as in three dates of community service. We have also volunteered with Habitat for Humanity and will continue to do so over the next several months. In house, you might find us eating pizza or painting murals, but you'll also occasionally see us at local retirement homes on Senior Adult Visits and annually in Widener Hall as we serve the entire congregation the best plate of Spaghetti and Meatballs your capital gains can buy. Moreover, we initiated a new and exciting group a couple years ago that meets under the moniker: Theology and Pretzels. Mirroring the format of the more-adult Theology on Tap, we meet once a month for brunch and discuss and debate current events, especially as they relate to the understanding of our faith and spirituality.

Junior High Youth Group:

Like their older brethren, the Jr. High Youth Group travels to West Kensington for worship and service and occasionally joins Brian on Senior Adult Visits. They are known to play high-energy games such as Manhunt and Dodgeball, followed by brief yet substantive conversations on scripture and its relevance in young life in 2017-2018. They are key contributors in helping to organize the Warmth Drive; and two of the last four preachers for Youth Sunday came from the 8th grade.

Christian Education and Ministries to and by Children and Families

Children and families of PCCH continue to grow and learn, thanks be to God! We all learn in different





ways. This year we have learned more about leading lives of faith as we have participated in God's work in the world:

- Through the church's participation in our second Harry Potter Festival, our children have learned to extend radical hospitality to our community.
- Through our second summer of Garden, Music, and Art Camp (a fancy name for our Vacation Bible School), our children have learned that God counts them, claims them, and calls them to count every other person as a beloved child of God.
- Through a re-imagined fellowship for 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders, our children have learned that serving God can be fun and can strengthen our bonds to one another.
- Through Dinner Church where our children gather around tables with families of all shapes and sizes, they have learned the importance of breaking bread together—and that everyone is welcome at God's table.
- Through our annual Christmas Eve pageant, our children have learned that God's story often confounds our understanding and bids us stand in awe of a God who would enter into the world as a helpless newborn baby.
- Through building and caring for a new community garden on PCCH's front lawn, our children have learned the miracle of God's creation—that seeds become plants and plants produce food that we can share with our neighbors. They have also learned that when we work together, we can accomplish more than we could on our own.
- Through collaborating with Dan, Ken, Cindy, and Brian and learning from them as we coordinate the music we sing with the scripture passages, prayers, sacraments, and church seasons that guide our weekly worship.

- Through dropping folded up dollar bills and spare change into the children's offering basket each week and collecting food and warm clothing for our neighbors, our children have learned that we love God by sharing what we have with others.
- Through Church School led by a dedicated team of teachers and shepherds, our children are learning that God's stories are also their stories—and that the ancient words of the Bible continue to speak into our lives today. As the children learn, so do I. This past year, in an attempt both to save money and to tailor our church school curriculum to our own children, I began writing our church school lessons instead of using prepackaged curriculum. This shift has given us the flexibility to be creative in our lessons and to accept feedback and input from the children and teachers themselves.



We hope to publish this curriculum once we have lessons for each Sunday in the three-year lectionary cycle. I am also learning through working with gifted colleagues—through hearing Cindy preach and watching as she molds a vision for PCCH; through presenting a workshop on curriculum and confirmation with Brian at Princeton Seminary's Institute for Youth Ministry; through collaborating with Dan, Ken, Cindy, and Brian and learning from them as we coordinate the music we sing with the scripture passages, prayers, sacraments, and church seasons that guide our weekly worship; through partnering with Leslie and the Center on the Hill to further the mission of the church through our participation in the Harry Potter Festival and the collection of plastic bags which will be woven into mats for our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness, and through supervising Cassie Paulk, our seminary intern, as she learns more about ministry in the church.

Outside of my work at PCCH, I serve the greater church by serving on the presbytery's Commission on Ministry, by providing pulpit supply and leadership of confirmation retreats, and by writing and editing for *Fidelia*, the online magazine of Young Clergy Women International (as well as for *The Christian Century* and *Connections* magazines and for an upcoming book on social justice by Phil Snyder). Most of all, I learn from building relationships with the people who are The Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill, for whom I am grateful.

Music

The church maintains a vital presence in Philadelphia's cultural world. We are home to the Grammy





Award winning choir The Crossing, Tempesta di Mare, Piffaro, Pennsylvania Girlchoir, and of course our own Gallery Choir which provides the music that is so vital to our worship services.

This November's Festival of Music and Arts was a testament to our Music and Arts ministry at PCCH. Our church was home to a landmark art show, Souls Shot, which focused on the victims of gun violence in Philadelphia. Curated by PCCH members Laura Madeline and Rebecca Thornburgh in partnership with Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence, the project paired each of the twenty-five artists with the family of a victim. Through their conversations and sharing of pictures and memories, a portrait was created representing each subject at the pinnacle of their life. The impact of seeing so many souls that were taken away abruptly impacted each of the hundreds that gathered in Widener Hall on opening night.

Saturday featured a play reading of 26 Pebbles, a reaction to the shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary School. Organized by Margaret Spencer, members of the church presented this exploration into the impact that a mass shooting has on members of a community based on interviews with the people of Newtown, CT.

The Philadelphia-based Prometheus Chamber Orchestra joined the Gallery Choir and Soloists, conductor Daniel Spratlan, and organist Ken Lovett for a brilliant performance of Mozart's Requiem on the final day of the Festival. The concert also featured the world premiere of Unspoken Words by Pulitzer Prize winning composer Lewis Spratlan. This direct, impassioned response to the gun violence epidemic was commissioned for the Festival along with its libretto by poet Paul Kane.

Further work on the older sections of the garden will take place in the spring to stabilize the

drifting stone heads and to bring those sections of the garden up to the standard of the newest section.

We continue to be grateful for PCCH's relationships with our resident music groups: The Crossing Choir, Piffaro, Tempesta di Mare, The Pennsylvania GirlChoir, and Philo¬musica in addition to the many groups that use our building weekly. We have also recently acquired two dance groups (Mostly Waltz and the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society) that will be using the Burleigh Cruikshank Chapel as well as Widener Hall throughout the year. Both of these groups are very vocal in their praise of those spaces.

A huge thank you to the staff at PCCH, for their hard work, dedication and unfailing goodwill. And to all of you at PCCH who volunteer your time and energy to make the church a beautiful, welcoming place to worship, serve and fellowship – many thanks! As we make our way through this coming year I look forward to meeting more of you.

Center on the Hill

The Center on the Hill, the place for active adults at PCCH, provides a variety of programs, activities, and resources to enrich the lives of seniors in the greater Chestnut Hill area. This past year has been a year of tremendous growth in the number of course offerings as well as the number of participants enjoying the Center's offerings. In addition to our weekly classes like Golden Yoga, T'ai Chi, Folk Dancing, Zumba Gold, French Conversation, Mah Jongg and bridge play, local seniors enjoyed:

- Continued our longtime partnership with Chestnut Hill College for Griffin's Give Back Day, where college students volunteer their time to help seniors with light home projects
- Android and I-Phone classes
- Writing Your Life Story workshop series
- Learning to Look art appreciation classes
- Our first ever Center on the Hill Antique Roadshow with the help of The Antique Gallery of Chestnut Hill
- Wednesday Diabetes Workshop
- New SEPTA ID card program (Key cards)
- Two Balance and Stability workshops with a local chiropractor
- Co-hosted (with a local retirement community) the

"I Will Never Forget" program, a book reading and discussion led by Elaine Pereira author of "I Will Never Forget - A Daughter's Story of Her Mother's Arduous and Humorous Journey Through Dementia"

• Trips (many using our church van) to the Princeton University Art Muse-

um, Chanticleer Gardens, Mural Arts Philadelphia, the Museum of the American Revolution, the Philadelphia Zoo, and Bartram's Garden to name a few.

• And much more.

Our Speaker Series on the Hill (formerly the Men's Luncheon) series continues to be a successful monthly (September – May) event for PCCH members and the surrounding community. Under the capable hands of Stan Elwell and John Lawton, the Speaker Series on the Hill has invited thought-provoking and engaging speakers such as:

- Emmanuel Nkundunkundiye (University of Penn student who survived the genocide in Rwanda)
- Jenny Rose Carey (Director of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society which hosts the Philadelphia Flower show)
- Sam Katz (Public Historian and Civic Entrepreneur)

- James Chan (Businessman and expert in doing business with China)
- Harry Groome (Retired Healthcare Chairman and Award Winning Author)

And in 2017, Chris Wheeler, beloved and longtime presenter at the Speaker Series, passed the torch to Mike Sielski (Sports Journalist at the Philadelphia Inquirer) as Chris began his retirement in Florida. Our 2018 speakers are sure to not disappoint.

We continued to engage in intergenerational programming and our partnership with the PCCH Preschool. Inspired by Martin Luther King's day of service, Pat Dennis, Director of the Preschool, and I coordinated a snack bag project benefiting seniors in the Chestnut Hill Meals on Wheels program. We collected and packed snack bags including goodies like raisins, crackers and cookies and a sweet note from the preschooler (handwritten with the help of a senior). Together they created almost 60 care packages. We partnered a second time

to help the Preschoolers make their Mother's Day gifts, a delicious chocolate treat for Mommy. In 2018, we plan to work together again on a Valentine's Day craft.

In 2017, the Center on the Hill continued providing Memory Cafés due to the gracious and generous grant given by

the Presbytery of Philadelphia. Memory Cafés are a European innovation that is slowly taking hold in the U.S. It provides a safe, comfortable, and supportive environment for people with dementia (and their caregivers) to socialize as well as offering a range of fun and engaging activities. We held three Memory Cafés (one per semester) each with a different theme or activity. One café included dancing led by a professional dance instructor, then we had some pet-therapy with Comfort Caring Canines, and finally a therapeutic movements program led by a recreation therapist.

This past year the Center on the Hill seniors played an even more active role in PCCH's part of the Harry Potter Festival. We had seniors volunteering at the registration desk for the Friday movie night, similar to the previous year, and we also had senior volunteers helping sell water, pizza and Harry Potter themed items on



our front lawn during the day on Saturday. The most exciting and wonderful Harry Potter themed items sold were the hand-crafted Harry Potter pillows. These pillows were individually sewn and painted by Velma, a 91-year young senior who frequents the Center on the Hill. Vel (as she is known by friends and family) continues to create these pillows and other crafts for the 2018 Harry Potter Festival. What a generous soul to give of her time and talent to help PCCH's mission partners!

Seniors who come through our doors continue to impress me with their dedication to improving their health and wellbeing and their willingness to learn something new. They're a true inspiration. I feel truly blessed to serve our seniors and for the opportunity PCCH has given me through their forethought and creation of the Center on the Hill. I also feel extremely fortunate to work with such a talented, compassionate and dedicated set of staff here at PCCH.

February

- Kicked off a mini capital campaign called "Keeping the Faith" to raise \$600,000 over a two year period, including a mission tithe, which has already begun funding projects like the removal of the old boiler, front walk and steeple repair, and purchase of a new sanctuary piano, kitchen equipment, and signage
- Received Jim Burns, Rebecca DePasquale, Cheryl Huddleston and Cristian Macelaru into membership

April (March cancelled due to weather):

- New elders and deacons were examined and approved for ordination/installation
- JoAnn West announced her retirement as of the end of July
- Session Committee Manual was distributed

May:

- 19 confirmands were examined and approved for membership and praised Brian Russo for his work developing the innovative curriculum which leads to such rich statements of faith
- Capital Campaign reported \$575K pledges in hand/ Session voted to go forward with the purchase of the sanctuary piano
- Session voted to approve the resolution recognizing all standing committees of session as outlined in the "Session Committee Manual 2017-2018"
 - Melody and Comedy reported an income of \$550!

September:

- Engaged the firm of Clifton, Larson and Allen to conduct our 2017 audit in 2018.
- Approved expansion of Memorial Garden (\$5K)
- Capital Campaign reported \$629,370 in pledges with \$233,415 received to date
- Session will explore adding a Property Committee and a Hospitality Committee to standing committees

October:

- Cassie Paulk welcomed as our seminarian from Palmer Theological Seminary
- Personnel Committee led the session in a preliminary discussion of two options before the church concerning how to handle pastoral transition when Cindy's retires: the interim minister and the co-minister model
- A committee was formed to address the enrollment issue facing the Pre-School

November:

- James and Samantha Aitken, Alison Rudolf and Emily Barth Werner were received into membership
- Music and Arts Committee reported that the Music and Arts Weekend was a "rip-roaring success"
- Pre-School Committee reported that the initial meeting was productive and included parents
- Session engaged in a second discussion concerning pastoral transition plans and approved the following motion: "The session of PCCH directs the clerk of session to send a request to the Committee on Congregations and Leadership for approval to create a position of co-pastor"

Social Witness

In 2017 our congregation bore witness to God's love through mission work to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, witness lives lost to gun violence, bring joy to children in poverty, welcome refugees, provide a safe harbor for victims of domestic violence, educate children, free the innocent, and so much more. The di-



rect efforts and financial contributions of our congregation...

Began a new partnership with Face to Face Germantown where we assisted in preparing and serving free meals to the Germantown community, gave \$3,250 to support their work, and taught two 6-hour financial literacy sessions as part of their THRIVE life-skills program... Continued our support of Our Brother's Place men's shelter by providing sloppy joe dinners prepared by our congregation each month... Gave \$7,500 to Broad Street Ministry to further their radical hospitality approach to ministry and witness... At Christmas, shared grin-inspiring gifts with 25 children who are guests of ACHIEVEability's transitional housing program for homeless families and four families who are supported by Philadelphia Interfaith Hospitality Network (PIHN), as well as gave \$2,000 to West Kensington Ministry to "Stock the Pantry"... Supported the wonderful efforts of the Music and Arts Committee's Festival of Music and Arts weekend dedicated to ending gun violence which raised nearly \$3,000 for Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence.... Committed \$5,000 to help the Souls Shot exhibit travel and be replicated in other communities... Cooked and shared meals with 3 homeless families who were guests of PIHN, donated 50 backpacks chock full of school supplies for pre-K and school-age children they work with, and gave the organization \$5,000 to support their work... Gave \$3,000 to Dawn's Place to improve the lives of women who have been victimized by commercial sexual exploitation... Continued our participation in a faith coalition created to support a young Syrian woman who came

from a refugee camp in Turkey to study at LaSalle University ... Gave \$12,000, monthly groceries, Thanksgiving dinner fixings, and household supplies and food from our reverse Advent boxes to Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry to support our neighbors in need in Germantown... Wielded hammers and assorted power tools at several Habitat for Humanity Saturday workdays, and gave them \$3,250 to support their efforts... Gave \$3,000 to help fund the PCCH Youth Mission Trip to Calgary... Attended The Welcome Church's outdoor worship service on the Parkway and hosted the "coffee" hour afterward, which has a special focus on hungry and homeless Philadelphians... And gave, did, and inspired so much more as witnesses to God's love of each and every person!



The Stewardship Committee— Ask. Seek. Knock.

HELLO! Our Tony Award-winning 2018 Stewardship Campaign began on October 15 with elders and deacons singing the opening song from Broadway's Book of Mormon, with clever new lyrics and a rousing chorus of "A pledge can change your life!" As in the past two years, we challenged the congregation to increase their pledge by 1% of their household income. For four consecutive Sundays, leaders in the congregation gave 1-minute Stewardship messages focusing on four key aspects: social witness, music and arts, Christian education and youth, and worship and pastoral care. We included special announcements in the bulletins each week and hung ASK SEEK KNOCK banners from the front portico. We simplified our Stewardship brochure and mailed it with a letter from Cindy about a week prior to mailing pledge cards. Stewardship Sunday, November 19, included a celebratory pancake breakfast for all.

Our 2018 pledge goal was \$690,000, including mission dollars. As of the writing of this report, we are at 92% of our goal, with \$633,000 in pledges. Of the 156 pledges received, 69 increased, 60 stayed the same, 16 are down, and 11 are new. About 34 pledges are yet to come in and a call campaign is underway for follow up.

Thanks to our amazing Stewardship Committee for their energy and enthusiasm on this successful campaign—Hello!

Investment Committee Report 2017

The Investment Committee comprised of Harry Spaeth, Michael Elwell, Cindy Jarvis, Mark Nottingham, Matt Abernethy, Brian DiDonato and John Lawton continued to faithfully oversee the Endowment Funds of our church. Our committee is responsible for investments that are managed by Merrill Lynch and PNC.

The 2017 Endowment Funds provided funds of \$129,927 to support the operating budget and \$104,594 to support the Senior Adult ministry of the church. 
