Dear members and friends of the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill,

What was 2022?

- A Year of Transition? Yes!
- A Year of Re-emergence? Yes!
- A Year of Matthew 25? Yes!
- A Year of the Phillies Almost Winning the World Series? Yes!

I will remember 2022 as the year when we sought to find a groove after the worst of the Covid pandemic, seeking to discover the right balance between returning to some familiar practices while living into new ones.

Our in-person worship numbers continued to rise, as did the numbers of children and youth.

At the same time, it's clear that the pandemic gave some the opportunity to revisit their worship attendance habits, while others are participating in worship through our livestream.

When I talk with people about all of this, two key words keep popping up, "relationships" and "engagement." What does this look like for us?

2022 was also a year of significant personnel transition.

- Ken Lovett, our fabulous Organist and Associate Director of Music, retired after a distinguished career. A fine musician, Ken was also a valued liturgical partner and colleague.
- Roberta Kearney served as our Interim Associate Pastor for a 12-month term, providing faithful leadership to our children's and adult education programs. We thank Roberta for her service and wish her well in her new call.
- In November we learned that Brian Russo will move to Grace Presbyterian Church in Jenkintown. We are grateful for Brian's long and faithful ministry with us, and for the important relationships he forged with many across the spectrum. We wish him every blessing in this new ministry.
- We welcomed Jeffrey DeVault as our new Organist and Associate Director of Music in the fall. Jeff
 hit the ground running with grace. His musicianship and presence are very welcome additions to our
 life together.
- We are grateful that Megan Petero has agreed to help shepherd both our youth and children's programs through this season of transition. Megan has a great relational spirit and is working faithfully, with great teams of advisors and teachers, to keep things moving ahead.
- In the fall, the Session named Cynthia Jarvis as pastor emeritus, honoring her longtime, distinguished leadership at PCCH. I am grateful to Cindy for her friendship and support.

Clearly, among other things, 2023 will be a year of continued transition, but also a time when we welcome new leadership to help provide wisdom and guidance in our ongoing re-emergence.

Our Matthew 25 commitment continued to take root and grow. This is important work for us. In October, we held our first Day of Service, a time to work on service projects but also build congregational connections. It was wildly successful!

We also held a series of luncheons over the fall – I presented on my Lilly Endowment grant work, and we welcomed others to help us consider the shape of our social witness ministry.

We continued to welcome greater numbers of guests each Sunday, seeking to provide a hospitable space for them to explore their faith.

Financially, 2022 was a unique year. The Session adopted a budget with an intentional deficit built in, centered on personnel commitments. By the end of the year, we had succeeded in eliminating that budget – through your support and prudent management.

Pledge results for 2023 are improved over the past several years. That is great news! Thank you!

Also – I got Covid...twice. Enough of that!

I continue to be grateful for this call to serve this congregation in this season. We have been blessed with an abundance of gifts — a great staff team, a deepening sense of call to serve our broader communities, your generous support, a beautiful building that is in good shape, people continuing to show up to ask big questions of faith and life.

I will make no predictions about the Phillies' World Series chances! I will predict, however, that as the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill continues to re-emerge and experience transition, that God will call us to new and exciting ventures, as we engage and build relationships and seek to serve God in the spirit of Matthew 25.



MUSIC AND ARTS



The Gallery Choir had another wonderful year of music making and leading worship in 2022. We welcomed our new Organist and Associate Director of Music Jeffrey DeVault to the staff, and elevated Julie Snyder to Director of Children's and Youth Music.

Some of the year's highlights:

- In April, we enjoyed our annual Melody and Comedy evening with a silent auction in April, presented by the Music and Arts Committee.
- In June, we had a combined concert with the Drexel University Chorus and Gallery Choir at PCCH in June, featuring music of Lewis Spratlan and Edie Hill
- In October, we hosted a concert with the Philadelphia Orchestra Concertmaster David Kim, the soloists of the PCCH Gallery Choir, and accompanist Jeffrey DeVault
- In November, we hosted Souls Shot Portrait Project weekend with an opening reception for the sixth annual Souls Shot Portrait Project exhibition and a performance of T.L. da Victoria's Requiem during Sunday worship.
- The sanctuary was the site of several performances by Piffaro, Tempesta di Mare, the Pennsylvania Girlchoir, and the now three-time Grammy-winning choir The Crossing.

Children and Youth Music

Our Children's and Youth Music Ministries continued to flourish in 2022. *Joyful Noise*, our children's choir, met weekly after worship for rehearsals and sang in worship each month during the school year. In rehearsals, the children continue to work on vocal technique, ensemble singing, sacred song repertoire in a variety of styles, understanding the connection between our song texts and the scriptures, and learning the musical components of our worship service. Joyful Noise also performed a *Little Mermaid* medley in our Melody and Comedy fundraiser in April.

Our *Youth Choir* began meeting weekly in September under Julie Snyder's direction. This small but capable group of singers sang several times in worship with Joyful Noise this fall and is preparing several anthems on its own

for the upcoming months. Several of the members of the Youth Choir have contributed musically to the worship service through instrumental preludes, and one member has also joined the Gallery Choir. Engaging the youth more actively in the musical life of the church is a continued goal of the music staff.




Organist and Associate Director of Music

I am truly honored and grateful to be your new Organist and Associate Music Director. Not only has the congregation been so warm and welcoming, but also working with the incredible staff and being part of a phenomenal music program has been a joy. It has been a busy and exciting four months since I began the job. Some highlights:

- I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know our Mander organ. Ken Lovett was wonderful to help me get acclimated with this fine instrument. The organ blower needed repair and was removed, rebuilt, and reinstalled in early 2023. In addition, our organ technicians have informed us that future refurbishments will eventually be necessary due to age and use.
- Concertmaster of the Philadelphia Orchestra David Kim and I gave a recital in October to an enthusiastic audience. We were joined by the soloists of the Gallery Choir for the program.
- A climate control system was installed on the Steinway piano to help protect the instrument from dry air in the winter and humidity in the summer. My longtime piano tuner, Don Roberts, now services all of the pianos at the church.

SOCIAL WITNESS / MATTHEW 25

This year we continued our efforts to figure out how to best serve our partners in a world emerging from the pandemic. In-person volunteer opportunities remained limited, but our congregation continued to bear witness to God's love through mission work to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, witness lives lost to gun violence, bring joy to children in poverty, welcome refugees, provide a safe harbor for victims of domestic violence, educate children, free the innocent, and so much more.

We continued our ongoing efforts to feed the hungry by collecting food for distribution to Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry throughout the year. We also continued our involvement with Face to Face by providing "to go" lunches and by joining together several times throughout the year to make ziti in our church's kitchen. We brought joy to children in poverty with one of our favorite activities — the PIHN backpack drive. We provided over 60 backpacks filled with school supplies to children in PIHN's program to help make back-to-school a bit easier. Our partnership with West Kensington Ministry has continued to grow with several programs throughout the year, one of which being sponsorship and volunteering at their annual golf outing. This fall, the Social Witness Committee kicked off the

program year with an all-church Day of Service in October. After church, we all gathered in Widener Hall, the kitchen, and front lawn to work together on multiple projects including ziti and sandwich making for Face to Face, sorting clothes for a warmth drive for West Kensington, and setting up the Memorial to the Lost on the front lawn. During the Christmas season, in partnership with the Preschool, we collected gifts for 45 children through ACHIEVEability and collected and sorted reverse advent boxes for Face to Face, Family Promise, Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry, and West Kensington Ministry. We continued to support our many partners financially including Heeding God's Call, Dawn's Place, Centurion Ministries, Broad Street Ministry, and Souls Shot. We are excited to return to more in-person service projects and are planning a return to Face to Face in February.

CENTER ON THE HILL



The Center on the Hill, the place for active adults at PCCH, spent its twelfth year offering a variety of programs, events and activities that enriched the lives of the seniors in Chestnut Hill and our surrounding communities. January of 2022 marked the return to fully in-person programs and activities. We also continued to maintain an online presence for those still wanting to participate from home. While we no longer offered live streamed events and classes, we did begin recording many of our wellness lectures and speakers, as well as continuing to post fitness videos, watch and learn presentations, interactive games, art lessons, community resources and more, online completely free for anyone to access on our website.

Active adults returned robustly in April, May and June, and we often found ourselves with waitlists for many activities as group size limits were still in place as part of our Covid protocols. It was so rewarding to see so many people returning to take part in our programs, such as:

- □ tai chi classes
- □ 'Golden Yoga' classes
- health and wellness lectures
- play readings
- classes in the basics of Android phones and iPhone/iPad
- watercolor painting
- □ bingo, bunco, qigong, and trivia game sessions
- □ 'Name That Tune' games
- □ computer classes
- cooking classes for diabetes and nutrition
- grief counseling
- □ 'Learning to Look at Art' classes
- □ 'Well Spouse' and Alzheimer's support groups

Funds from the grant we received from the Covenant Fund of the Presbytery in 2021 continued to support us throughout 2022 by helping many seniors from our surrounding communities participate in some of our paid programs that they would not have been able to afford otherwise, including our class 'Making a Tile Mosaic,' offered by the Mosaic Society of Philadelphia, which resulted in a permanent tile mosaic in the entryway of the Center. Thanks to the generous grant, this year over 200 people were able to participate in programs that we offered at a

reduced cost.

February 2023 marks my fourth anniversary as Director of the Center on the Hill. I am profoundly grateful for the continued opportunity to serve this community each year. I could not do it without all the church staff who support the Center, and our instructors, partners and volunteers who make programs and events possible. The Center on the Hill and the community we serve continue to flourish and grow each season through our combined efforts. I am looking forward to a vibrant and busy year ahead at the Center.

FORUM ON THE HILL

The Forum on the Hill is a monthly event (September-June) presented in collaboration with the Center on the Hill which appeals to our neighbors and the members of PCCH as well. It is a part of the church's outreach efforts and is a means to offer relevant and thought provoking information presented by speakers who are knowledgeable and accomplished in their particular fields. PCCH's history of inviting guest speakers goes back nearly forty years.

2022 began with speakers including Kathleen Barron, L. J. Rasi and Danny Rivera discussing *The Impact of the Opioid Crisis on a Community*, and Dr. Jason Karlawish talking about his book *The Problem of Alzheimer's*. In the spring the Rev. Dr. Beth Shalom Hessel presented on *The Right to Be American: Japanese Americans and World War II* and world musician Michael Kraus shared his stories of being *A*

Modern Renaissance Man. The Fall forums featured the Rev. Dr. John Wilkinson speaking about *The Post-Pandemic Church*, author Josh Hitchens talking about his book *Haunted History of Philadelphia*, and the Executive Director of Mural Arts Philadelphia Jane Golden came to share information about this vibrant city program now entering its third decade of work in our city.

The Forum continues to seek speakers who can engage our attendees in conversations and share dialogue about their topics. Each presentation is recorded and streamed online after the event takes place for people who cannot attend in person and want to engage with us online.

PCCH PRESCHOOL

The best first school experience can be found at Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill Preschool. Our expert faculty, strong traditions, beautiful new playground, and dedicated families mean that our children experience a well-rounded, developmentally-appropriate, and fully nurturing education. This year, we have 79 students enrolled in six classrooms. Next year, we hope to have closer to 90 students enrolled in seven classrooms.

Some highlights of the year:



- Specials teachers returned. Our children have weekly music, soccer, and ballet classes taught by qualified teachers in these fields.
- On-campus experiential learning opportunities included visits from Briar Bush Nature Center, the Philadelphia Goat Project, and the Fire Department of Philadelphia.
- Our teachers re-committed to early childhood best practices and the implementation of the following curricula: Singapore Math, Core Knowledge, Handwriting without Tears, Heggerty Reading, and Wilson Phonics.
- We have collaborated with the Center on the Hill for trick or treating, saying grace at their

Thanksgiving program, and decorating their Christmas tree.

- Our parents' committee has been hosting great family and parent-only events to strengthen our community.
- We have helped three of our teachers off-set the cost of finishing their bachelor's and master's degrees.
- At this point in the year, 73% of our eligible students are re-enrolling for next year and almost all of our admissions inquiries are referred by our current families.

CHURCH ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

2022 was a busy year at the church with both congregational and outside group activities returning in full force. Every day the church staff welcomes dozens of people for classes, meetings and rehearsals. A typical weekday morning at PCCH might find Diane Cornely and Grace Stewart beautifying the church inside and out, the Center on the Hill and the preschool buzzing with activity and vendors making deliveries and repairs to the building. No two days are ever the same at PCCH!

The building and property are in good condition as we start 2023. The sanctuary looks especially beautiful after having its windows and shutters sanded and painted over the summer. The repair of the organ blower is complete. Unfortunately, we have several leaks in the steeple. The exterior steeple repair will coincide with some upgrades to the T-Mobile cell tower housed within, minimizing any disruption to the church. We anticipate this work being



completed by the end of June. We are also hoping to replace the blinds in Widener Hall with automated roller shades this spring. If you ever notice something around the building in need of attention or repair, please don't hesitate to reach out to let me know.

The PCCH sanctuary and chapel continue to be popular performance spaces for area music and choral groups. The Crossing, the Pennsylvania Girlchoir, Piffaro, Tempesta di Mare, Philomusica, Philadelphia Women's Music Project and our very own Cantatas and Chamber Music concerts continue to be very popular. We have hosted ballroom dance classes, international folk dancing, the Royal Scottish Country Dancers, Allons Dancers, and a Bollywood, Indian Folk and Classical dance class. The Outdoor Gardeners, The Weeders and the Delaware Valley Rock Garden Society all held meetings here. 2022 also brought several Red Cross blood drives, various MALT (Mt. Airy Learning Tree) classes, Boy Scout leadership meetings, a Souls Shot exhibition, and weekly Weight Watchers, BNI and Rotary Club meetings. FINANCE & TREASURER'S REPORT

The Finance Committee and the Treasurer are responsible for overseeing the Operating Budget, the Senior Adult Ministry Budget, financial oversight of the Preschool, and the various restricted funds that help the Church in its mission. Once the budget is established for the year, the Finance Committee meets monthly to review our progress, and on an as-needed basis with a representative from Main Line Accounting, our third-party accountants. Cash flow management for the church is also reviewed and monitored to coordinate with the Investment Committee to time the draws from the endowment that need to take place. The Finance Committee's monthly review and any recommendations are then reported to Session regularly.

A summary of 2022 financial results as well as the Sessionapproved budget for 2023 are included for review and comparison. We recommended to the Session a 2022 budget that included a built-in deficit. We were grateful that over the year, your financial support and prudent management allowed us to eliminate that deficit, and we finished 2022 with a balanced budget.

Thanks to Linda Amsterdam for taking the treasurer mantle from Steve Bishop, and to Harry Spaeth for his unwavering oversight of our financial life.

Thank you one and all for your continued dedication to the financial stewardship of the Church.
